#### **Discussion Items / Official Communications**

1.	Ordinance: Amend Chapter 110 Construction Codes, Uniform Section 110-4 Site Plan Review for Detached Single Family Dwellings. Mr. Senande indicated that this ordinance will codify the current process. Councilman Marsden noted perhaps it should not read as "a copy should be submitted" but rather "a copy with a raised seal should be submitted". Councilman Gross questioned if this would add more time to the process and was assured that this is the current process, it has just not been put into code yet, no time would be added to the process.  The consensus was to move forward.  At this point the time for the public portion of the meeting could be allowed and Mayor Dale opened up the public portion to accommodate the residents in the meeting room.
2.	Ordinance: Route 23 Cannabis Establishment Overlay Zone. Mr. Senande indicated that because Route 23 is so unique, an overlay was recommended for that area. It makes the rules uniform for cannabis businesses along route 23 regardless of the zone. It applies to businesses that have their entrances facing the highway. Councilwoman Lichtenberg reminded everyone that some changes had been made in a prior draft and Mr. Senande said that those prior changes could be added in. There was some discussion about businesses bordering other properties and the orientation of the businesses to be facing the road. Councilman Chazukow had concerns about the possibility of business being conducted right behind a school. He did not want to hold anything up but wanted this to be considered moving forward. Mr. Senande said it could be worked out for introduction. It would not be considered spot zoning.
3.	Ordinance: Accessory Structure in the Front Yard. Mr. Senande indicated that the summary from the Planner said that the ordinance is currently unclear whether a structure is allowed in the front yard. Councilman Marsden gave the example of an accessory structure being in front of a primary structure but if it was within the set-back that accessory structure would meet the requirement. The idea is to allow people to avoid going for a variance to some degree. If people still want to build in a setback area they would still need to apply for a variance.  The consensus was to move forward.
4.	41 Kinswood: Request for Retaining Wall in R.O.W. Attorney Pasternak indicated that this item was only a discussion item. Changes can be made to the draft. Councilwoman Lichtenberg indicated that the current phrasing was contradictory. Attorney Pasternak indicated that the way it should read is that the agreement, should it move forward, would run with the land. There was more discussion and talk about the septic. Councilman Chazukow was not in favor, believing that it rewarded bad behavior. The consensus was to move forward.

#### **Public Comments:**

Mayor Dale explained how the public portion of the meeting is conducted.

The following residents expressed concern and outrage regarding the recent cutting of trees in the wooded area of the Camelot Estates neighborhood. David Mussina, 9 King Arthur Court; Mark Bachmann, 51 Camelot Drive; Brian Kochan, 23 King Arthur Court; Laura Ashtyani, 32 Hoplar Place; Morgan Kelly, 57 Camelot Drive; Jonathan Durant, 27 Mountain Circle;

Many of them are longtime residents of the neighborhood and utilize the wooded area for walking dogs, hiking etc. Many feel upset and thought there should have been some conversation prior to the drastic measures taken. One questioned if the Township followed its own tree ordinance and is there a way an area could be designated for safe riding. If the trail is left in its current condition someone will get hurt. Residents wanted to know who made the decision to cut down all the trees. These residents spoke up because there has been an issue with illegal quad and dirt bike activity and many of the previous enforcement efforts have been ineffective. As a result, the Township has taken down trees and access has been blocked.

Richard Randazzo, 278 Wooley Road wanted to thank Mayor Dale for explaining the specifics about the Planning Board rules and procedures from a question raised at a previous meeting. Mr. Randazzo questioned possible conflicts of interest regarding the cannabis issue and the Council members and would like clarification on that subject from the Township Attorney. He indicated that no one was looking at the cons of the cannabis issue and the effects on younger children and teenagers. He also finds it disrespectful when someone speaks at a public meeting and their time runs out and a Council member says they have heard enough. The Council needs to focus.

#### **Council Comments:**

Mayor Dale - There has not been an increase in the Township's operating budget in the last 7 years and there isn't one this year. The operating budget is actually flat and we have been engaging in shared services where appropriate. Mayor Dale explained that in order to increase rateables we would have to build another complex like a ShopRite and because we are 100% in the Highlands it is not permitted. Various services have continued even though things like asphalt prices have gone up. Garbage is separate from the operating budget. It is the largest expense. It is challenging to even get bids for garbage in a town that has 80 square miles of land. In 2016 the State said that it wanted to have two legal riding areas for motorcycles and ATVs. Mayor Dale was a Councilwoman at the time and was on the task force for the project. We have a lot of land here that is State owned in West Milford and the State does not pay any taxes. At the time one option was to utilize the 800 acres in the old Jungle Habitat property as a place to ride and there was a great deal of outcry from the residents in the Mountain Circle property area. No one wants it in their backyard. The State of New Jersey denied West Milford's application to be a host community. The current problem stems from a law enforcement issue and we cannot ignore State Laws. There are environmental impacts that result from illegal riding. State, County and local law enforcement have all been involved but that was not sufficient. Mayor Dale indicated that the Township will be looking to Don Weise for advice because he has a lot of experience with trail management on many levels. We will be receiving a report soon from the Environmental Commission regarding this matter. Mayor Dale indicated that she and the members of the Council are extremely accessible and available. Her cell phone number is on her business card and she has a social media page and answers all her emails. She is constantly out amongst the public. The budget is posted on the website for all to see. There has also been great effort by the Mayor and Council to pay down the debt in the Township and the debt has gone down. The State of New Jersey collects tax for all the entities and then disseminates the money out. The Municipality represents 21% of the tax bill.

Councilman Marsden – Indicated that he had not seen the area where the trees had been cut down and will be going out to the site to see it for himself. As far as the cannabis comments regarding the impact on children, the purpose of regulation is to ensure you know what is in the product and the ordinances are intended for adults. It will still be illegal for children to buy, possess or use it.

Councilman Chazukow - There is separation of power and the Council cannot control law enforcement. He found out about the cutting of the trees on FaceBook. He considers the area to be his back yard as well because his house is located on the other side of the woods. Mr. Chazukow has an understanding about how the residents feel and does care. Other types of enforcement have not been sufficient and unfortunately it is a case of a few bad actors spoiling it for everyone. He reiterated the Mayor's statement that if the Township does not do everything within its power and someone gets hurt, the entire Township community will be held responsible and will have to pay. Mr. Chazukow is familiar with the tree ordinance and a certain diameter is allowable but once you intend to cut down a certain number of trees over a certain diameter a permit is necessary. In his layman's opinion, that amount of tree cutting could have been done by a resident without a permit. The government entity cutting the trees was not required to get a permit. He would like to ask the Township Insurer what the next step would be, as the situation is escalating. Councilman Chazukow asked the Township Attorney to explain once more what is permissible as far as his public engagement. Attorney Pasternak indicated that with what has been legally disclosed there is no conflict of interest. Mayor Dale indicated that the Mayor and Council have to fill out Financial Disclosure Statements every year as well as report who contributed to their campaigns when they run for election. In reference to synthetic marijuana, Councilman Chazukow indicated that is not actual marijuana and that is the purpose of the regulation. In regard to revenue opportunities in the Township, there are few, we mostly try to find ways to save funds, but having cannabis businesses is one way to gain revenue.

Councilwoman Erik – Indicated that though she has not been out on a horse lately, and has had recent knee surgery she will soon be back out riding and considers the woods and trails mentioned to be her back yard. She promised to fix the problem. Horses are legal.

Councilman Gross – A great deal of time is spent analyzing taxes and finding ways to save money whenever possible. Sometimes equipment is leased instead of purchased, every item is scrutinized. Marijuana is not a gateway drug. Councilman Gross shared a personal story about his son. Your children's friends may not be friends. Councilman Gross said that he and the rest of the Council are accessible. If people know who is operating the quads they should turn them in if they don't stop.

Councilwoman Lichtenberg – Indicated that she listens to the concerns from everyone and her phone number is 973-248-5427. Councilwoman Lichtenberg is also available every Friday at Town Hall from 10 a.m. to noon. The rules for the House Beautiful Contest are that the garden must be able to be seen from the road and professional landscaper use is not allowed.

# ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF WEST MILFORD COUNTY OF PASSAIC STATE OF NEW JERSEY TO EXCEED THE CALENDAR YEAR 2022 MUNICIPAL BUDGET APPROPRIATION LIMITS AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK (N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14)

**WHEREAS**, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S. 40A: 4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget to 2.50% unless authorized by ordinance to increase it to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and,

**WHEREAS,** N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.15a provides that a municipality may, when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

**WHEREAS**, the Township Council of the Township of West Milford in the County of Passaic finds it advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2022 budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens; and,

**WHEREAS**, the Township Council hereby determines that a 1.00% increase in the budget for said year, amounting to \$263,034.04 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and,

**WHEREAS** the Township Council hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED**, by the Township Council of the Township of West Milford, in the County of Passaic, a majority of the full authorized membership of this Governing Body affirmatively concurring, that, in the CY 2022 budget year, the final appropriations of the Township of West Milford shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14, be increased by 3.50%, amounting to \$920,619.14, and that the CY 2022 municipal budget for the Township of West Milford be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and,

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED**, that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF VARIOUS ROADS IN AND BY THE TOWNSHIP OF WEST MILFORD, IN THE COUNTY OF PASSAIC, NEW JERSEY, APPROPRIATING \$1,500,000 THEREFOR, DIRECTING A SPECIAL ASSESSMENT OF PART OF THE COST THEREOF, AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,428,000 BONDS OR NOTES OF THE TOWNSHIP FOR FINANCING THE SAME

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWNSHIP COUNCIL OF THE TOWNSHIP OF WEST MILFORD, IN THE COUNTY OF PASSAIC, NEW JERSEY (not less than two-thirds of all the members thereof affirmatively concurring), AS FOLLOWS:

**SECTION 1.** The improvement described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance is hereby authorized as a local improvement to be made or acquired by The Township of West Milford, in the County of Passaic, New Jersey. For the said improvement or purpose stated in said Section 3, there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$1,500,000, said sum being inclusive of all appropriations heretofore made therefor and including the sum of \$72,000 as the down payment for said improvement or purpose required by law and now available therefor by virtue of provision in a previously adopted budget or budgets of the Township for down payment or for capital improvement purposes.

**SECTION 2.** For the financing of said improvement or purpose and to meet the part of said \$1,500,000 appropriation not provided for by application hereunder of said down payment, negotiable bonds of the Township are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$1,428,000 pursuant to the Local Bond Law of New Jersey. In anticipation of the issuance of said bonds and to temporarily finance said improvement or purpose, negotiable notes of the Township in a principal amount not exceeding \$1,428,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law.

**SECTION 3.** (a) The improvement hereby authorized and purpose for the financing of which said obligations are to be issued is the reconstruction and resurfacing of various roads in and by the Township, including Hanover Road for its entire length, Alpine Court for its entire length, Beverly Court for its entire length, Princeton Road, for a portion thereof and Lyons Road for a portion thereof, so as to provide a roadway pavement at least equal in useful life or durability to a roadway pavement of Class B construction (as such term is used or referred to in section 40A:2-22 of said Local Bond Law) and being those lands designated on the official tax map of the Township as Lots 1, 3 and 4 in Block 901, Lots 1 and 22 in Block 905, Lot 1 in Block 906, Lots 7 to 9 and 11 to 16 in Block 1001, Lots 1, 3, 9, 11 and 12 in Block 1002, Lots 1 to 4 in Block 1003, Lots 1 to 3, 5, 8 to 11, 12.01, 12.02, 12.03 and 13 to 17 in Block 1004, Lots 1, 2, 5, 6, 8, 9 and 14 to 17 in Block 1005, and Lots 7 to 9 in Block 1006, including all storm water drainage facilities, milling, inlets, curbing, structures, appurtenances, equipment, site work, work and materials necessary therefor or incidental thereto, all as shown on and in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor on file or to be filed in the office of the Township Clerk and hereby approved.

- (b) The estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued for said purpose is \$1,428,000.
- (c) The estimated cost of said purpose is \$1,500,000, the excess thereof over the said estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued therefor being the amount of the said \$72,000 down payment for said purpose.

SECTION 4. The following additional matters are hereby determined, declared, recited and stated:

- (a) The said purpose described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance is not a current expense and is a property or improvement which the Township may lawfully acquire or make as a local improvement.
- (b) The period of usefulness of said purpose within the limitations of said Local Bond Law, according to the reasonable life thereof computed from the date of the said bonds authorized by this bond ordinance, is ten (10) years.
- (c) The supplemental debt statement required by said Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Township Clerk and a complete executed duplicate thereof has been filed in the office of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs of the State of New Jersey, and such statement shows that the gross debt of the Township as defined in said Local Bond Law is increased by the authorization of the bonds and notes provided for in this bond ordinance by \$1,428,000, and the said obligations authorized by this bond ordinance will be within all debt limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law.
- (d) An aggregate amount not exceeding \$200,000 for interest on said obligations, costs of issuing said obligations and other items of expense listed in and permitted under section 40A:2-20 of said Local Bond Law may be included as part of the cost of said improvement and is included in the foregoing estimate thereof.
- (e) As provided in Section 5 of this bond ordinance and subject to possible reduction as described in Section 5 of this bond ordinance, \$1,136,500 of the above-stated estimated cost of said improvement or purpose will be contributed by the Township at large to payment of the cost of said improvement or purpose, and the estimated maximum amount of the special assessments to be levied on property specially benefitted by said improvement is \$363,500, and the number of annual installments in which all such special assessments may be paid is ten (10).
- **SECTION 5.** The Township shall pay \$1,136,500 of the above-stated estimated cost of said local improvement (provided, however, that if the actual cost of said local improvement is less than the above-stated estimated cost of said local improvement, the Township's portion of the cost of said local improvement shall be reduced by the amount of said difference), and said amount shall be and hereby is contributed by the Township at large to payment of the cost of said local improvement. The cost of said local improvement, to the extent not met by the said amount contributed by the Township at large, shall be paid by special assessments which shall be levied in accordance with law on property specially benefitted thereby, as nearly as may be in proportion to and not in excess of the peculiar benefit, advantage or increase in value which the respective lots and parcels of real estate shall be deemed to receive by reason of said local improvement. The owner of any land upon which any such assessment shall have been made may pay such assessment in the number of equal annual installments hereinabove determined, all as may be provided in accordance with law and with legal interest on the unpaid balance of the assessment.

**SECTION 6.** All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by the chief financial officer, acting chief financial officer or treasurer of the Township (the "Chief Financial Officer"), provided that no note shall mature later than one year from its date. The notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the Chief Financial Officer. The Chief Financial Officer shall determine all matters in connection with the notes issued pursuant to this bond ordinance, and the Chief Financial Officer's signature upon the notes shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. All notes issued hereunder may be renewed from time to time subject to the provisions of N.J.S.A. §40A:2-8. The Chief Financial Officer is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the notes from time to time at public or private sale at not less than par and to deliver them to the purchasers thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price plus accrued interest from their dates to the dates of delivery thereof. The Chief Financial Officer is directed to report in writing to the governing body of the Township at the meeting next succeeding the date when any sale or delivery of the notes pursuant to this bond ordinance is made. Such report must include the principal amount, interest rate and maturities of the notes sold, the price obtained and the name of the purchaser.

**SECTION 7.** The full faith and credit of the Township are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on the said obligations authorized by this bond ordinance. Said obligations shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the Township, and the Township shall be obligated to levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable property within the Township for the payment of said obligations and interest thereon without limitation of rate or amount.

# ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF WEST MILFORD, COUNTY OF PASSAIC, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, AMENDING CHAPTER 135 "FEES AND COSTS" TO ADD A NEW SECTION 135-42 ENTITLED "FEES AND SPECIAL SERVICE CHARGES" UNDER THE NEW JERSEY OPEN PUBLIC RECORDS ACT (OPRA)" WITHIN THE TOWNSHIP CODE

**WHEREAS**, the Township Council wishes to update the Township Code, as to fees and special service charges under the New Jersey Open Public Records Act, N.J.S.A. 47:1A, et seq.; and

**WHEREAS**, N.J.S.A. 47:1A-5 directs that if the costs of duplication or production charged by a vendor exceeds routine charges, the actual direct cost of same without any additional surcharge for labor costs shall be paid; and

**WHEREAS**, the Township Code currently authorizes at Section 135-1, "Fees and costs established"; and

**WHEREAS**, the Township Council wishes to create a new section 135-42, to be entitled "Fees and Special Service Charges Under the New Jersey Open Public Records Act (OPRA)" to ensure clarity with regard to such requests.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED**, by the Township Council of the Township of West Milford, Passaic County, New Jersey, that the Code of the Township of West Milford shall be amended to create a new Section 135-42, and to read as follows:

**SECTION 1**. § 135-42 Fees, special service charges and special charges; when charged; amounts authorized.

#### § 135-42.1 Purpose

New Jersey has adopted the Open Public Records Act, N.J.S.A. 47:1A-5, which has as its general purpose making government records more available to the public than they have been in the past. In certain instances, the production of voluminous records, archived records, or records in a format which is not the usual format maintained by the municipality or other special circumstances would be costly and time consuming. The New Jersey Open Public Records Act permits the municipality to require the payment of fees, special service charges and/or special charges as a prerequisite to the production of records requiring extraordinary time and effort, special equipment or special formatting.

#### § 135-42.2 Ordinary requests for information.

## $\S~135\text{-}42.3$ Establish deputy custodians of records.

The establishment of the position of Deputy Custodians of Records within the Township of West Milford are as follows:

#### A. Chief of Police.

However, all requests must be made directly to the Custodian of Records, the Municipal Clerk.

#### $\S~135\text{-}42.4$ No research or interpretation may be compelled.

Nothing in this section shall require the Custodian or Deputy Custodians of documents or any other municipal official to examine, analyze, tabulate, or otherwise interpret documents which are subject to production under the New Jersey Open Public Records Act.

#### § 135-42.5 Special service charge/special charges authorized.

- A. Charges authorized. The Municipal Clerk or Deputy Custodian of documents qualifying for mandatory production as governmental records under the New Jersey Open Public Records Act shall be entitled to special service charges and/or special charges as set forth in this section.
- B. Requests to be in writing. Any requests for documents shall be made to the Municipal Clerk in writing and preferably on a form established by the Municipal Clerk for such purposes.
- C. Advance notice of fees, special service charges and special charges; deposit. Any requester of government records which may be eligible for the imposition of a fee, special charge or special service charge under this section shall receive advance notice of the amount of fees and charges before any work is started. The Municipal Clerk shall require prepayment of such charges before causing the work to begin.

#### $\S$ 135-42.6 Fees, special service charges and special charges; when charged; amounts authorized.

- A. Duplication or other work beyond capability of municipal-in-house work force. Whenever the in-house municipal work force or available municipal equipment is insufficient to duplicate or produce government records in a timely fashion, the Municipal Clerk may cause such duplication or production to be accomplished by outside vendors such as copy centers or producers of digital images. If the costs of such duplication or production charged by such vendors exceeds the routine charges set forth in N.J.S.A. 47:1A-5, the actual direct cost of same without any additional surcharge for labor costs shall be paid.
- B. Special service charged authorized. Whenever government records cannot be reproduced by regular copying equipment or fulfillment of the request would involve extraordinary time and effort (for example, where a large number of records must be recovered from storage or substantive staff time is required to review, redact, sort and/or assemble records), charges may be imposed as follows:
  - (1) The actual cost (materials and supplies but no staff labor) of duplication or reproduction; plus
  - (2) A special service charge of \$32 per hour or the actual direct cost of labor (if less) shall be imposed for each hour of extraordinary time predicted to be utilized to respond to the request.
- C. Rates for in-house production of prints or blueprints. Any prints or blueprints produced in-house in response to a governmental records request shall be produced for \$28 per page.
- D. Digital records. If a request for governmental records involves production or conversion of digital or computerized records or film which is:
  - (1) In a medium not routinely used by the agency (i.e., electronic or film).
  - (2) Not routinely developed or maintained by an agency; or
  - (3) Requiring a substantial amount of manipulation or programming of information technology.
- E. The requester shall pay fees and special charges incurred by the Township of West Milford if the conversion is done directly by the Township of West Milford as follows:
  - (1) Direct costs (no overhead) to comply with the request; plus
    - (a) Special charges; the lesser of the cost of technology and labor actually incurred or \$45 per hour.

#### § 135-42.7 Notice of requester of copyright laws.

- A. The Township of West Milford may be compelled by New Jersey Law to produce or duplicate governmental records, but no compliance with these legal obligations shall be deemed to constitute a license, sublicense or waiver of copyright laws.
- B. The Municipal Clerk shall give the following notice to any requester of governmental records. NOTICE COPYRIGHT LAWS

You must comply with U.S. copyright laws. These laws may restrict your right to use, duplicate or modify the records provided to you by the Township of West Milford.

You should consult your own legal counsel as severe civil and criminal penalties exist for violation of copyright laws.

#### § 135-42.8 Waivers for governmental or educational requester.

The Mayor, Clerk or Township Council (by resolution) may waive the fees or other charges otherwise chargeable if the requestor of governmental records is a governmental or educational entity.

**SECTION 2.** All ordinances of the Township of West Milford, which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance, are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

**SECTION 3.** If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid, preempted by Federal or State law, or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

**SECTION 4.** No provision of this Ordinance shall be construed to impair any common law or statutory cause of action, or legal remedy there from, of any person for injury or damage arising from any violation of this Ordinance or from other law.

**SECTION 5.** This Ordinance shall take effect immediately, upon final passage, approval, and publication as required by law.

**SECTION 6.** This Ordinance may be renumbered for codification purposes.
